

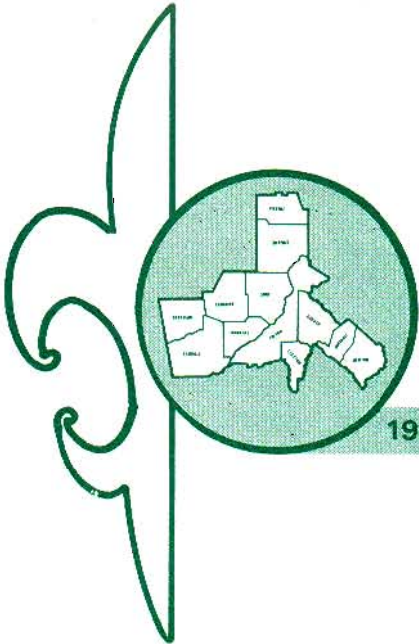

A C T I V I T I E S F O R T H E C O M P E T I T I V E E V E N T S

General Information: Egwa Tawa Dee has agreed to provide all necessary materials for the competitive events. The sponsoring lodge is responsible for the starting and smooth operation of its event. The sponsoring lodge is also responsible for the rules of its event.

- (1) CANOEING.....EGWA TAWA DEE LODGE
- (2) CHARIOT RACE.....ECHECONNEE LODGE
- (3) SACK RACE.....CHATTAHOOCHEE LODGE
- (4) CROSS COUNTRY RACE.....TOMO CHI CHI LODGE
- (5) ARCHERY.....IMMOKALEE LODGE
- (6) TUG-OF-WAR.....BOBWHITE LODGE

R U L E S F O R T H E C O M P E T I T I V E E V E N T S

A. GENERAL RULES:

- 1. Each lodge is expected to enter each event.
- 2. One person may enter only two events.
- 3. Judging and scoring will be by the lodge that is responsible for that event.
 - a. There will be 3 points for first place, 2 for second place, and 1 for third place.
 - b. All judging will be final
- 4. A revolving trophy will be awarded to the lodge with the highest total score at the closing session.
- 5. Arrowmen must hold a boy registration with the BSA in order to compete.

B. EVENT RULES:

1. Canoeing - Egwa Tawa Dee Lodge
 - a. Each lodge will enter two contestants, one canoe for an "in and out" race.
 - b. Participants will begin on shore with paddles in hand and life preservers on.
 - c. Canoes will be beached.
 - d. At the sound of the whistle, contestants will place canoes in the water, get in, and take off paddling. Scraping canoes on the shore will result in disqualification.
 - e. During the race, a whistle will be blown eight times. Each time the canoers will have to jump out of the canoe into the water, and climb back in before they can continue.
 - f. A course will be prescribed. First team to complete the course after the eighth whistle will be the winner.

2. Chariot Race - Echeconnee Lodge
 - a. A team of three members will represent each lodge.
 - b. The team will construct an "A" frame using the proper lashing. A diagonal lashing will be used at the top of the "A" frame and square lashing will be used at the bottom corners. Improper lashing will result in disqualification.
 - c. When the frame is completed, one member will ride the cross-bar by any means he wishes; and the other two members will drag, or carry the chariot over a course of 100 feet. If the rider falls off the chariot, the other two members must go back where he fell to pick him up; the rider cannot come to them.
 - d. Time stops when the team crosses the finish line.
 - e. The team with the best time wins.

3. Sack Race - Chattahoochee Lodge
 - a. One team from each lodge of two boys using the same sack.
 - b. A marked 40 yard course will be used.
 - c. The team with the best time is the winner.

4. Cross Country Race - Tomo Chi Chi Lodge
 - a. Each lodge will furnish one team of Arrowmen.
 - b. No shoes with spikes or cleats will be allowed. (Such as track shoes or football shoes.)
 - c. All teams will run a marked relay course.
 - d. Relay men will be at a specified relay point to run the next lap.
 - e. The fastest timed team will be the winner.

5. Archery - Immokalee Lodge
 - a. Each lodge will have two archers shooting five arrows each.
 - b. Highest total group score wins.
 - c. Arrows on a line will receive the highest score.
 - d. Arrows completely penetrating the target will be reshot.

6. Tug-of-War - Bobwhite Lodge
 - a. Each lodge will furnish one team of 15 Arrowmen.
 - b. The team pulling the entire opposing team across a pre-determined center line will be the winner.
 - c. The final winner shall be decided by elimination.
 - d. The same team will be used in all competition.
 - e. No cleats or spikes will be allowed.

INDIAN DANCE AND COSTUME COMPETITION RULES

A. General Rules:

1. Each lodge will appoint one judge. Judges must have three years active O A membership to be eligible.
2. Costumes made from kits will be acceptable.
3. Each contestant will be given a number to be worn on front and back of his costume during his part in the competition.
4. In the interest of time, if it becomes necessary to hold simultaneous events, the number of judges will be determined.

B. Activity Rules:

1. Pow Wow Dance:

- a. Music will be Volumes 1 & 2, War Dance of the Poncas.
- b. Permanent individual trophy for winner, certificates for second and third place.
- c. Elimination by the following:
 1. Dance Rhythm (Footwork and body movement)
 2. Timeliness & Attitude
 3. Authenticity

2. Solo Dance:

- a. Music by contestant's choice.
- b. Maximum of two contestants from any lodge.
- c. Permanent individual trophy for winner, certificates for second and third place.
- d. Judging to be based on the following:
 1. Oral summary by contestant on costume and dance.
 2. Authenticity
 3. Dance Rhythm (Footwork and body movement)
 4. Total time per contestant not to exceed 5 minutes.

3. Group Dance:

- a. Music by group's choice
- b. Only one entrant per lodge
- c. Revolving trophy for winning group
- d. Judging to be based on the following:
 1. Authenticity of narration, cost and dance
 2. Entrance (Effectiveness and dramatics)
 3. Group spirit and team effort
 4. Total time not to exceed 10 minutes per lodge
 5. Religious dance not permitted

4. Costume Competition:

- a. Permanent individual trophy for winner, certificates for second and third place.
- b. Judging to be based on the following:
 1. Narration limited to 4 minutes (not including questions)
 2. Authenticity
 3. Total work effort
 4. Knowledge of costume

TRADING POST

- (A) The Trading Post will have an assortment of light refreshments and assorted souvenirs.
- (B) The Trading Post will be closed during meals, discussion groups, and evening programs.

ELECTION PROCEDURES

- (A) First nominations will be held after Saturday lunch.
- (B) Second nominations will be held after Saturday dinner.
- (C) Campaign speeches will be held after Sunday breakfast.
- (D) Elections will be held after the campaign speeches on Sunday.
 - 1. Each lodge will have one vote for each office.

PATCH DISTRIBUTION

- (A) Patches will be given to the advisors of each lodge at the close of the adult meeting on Saturday morning.
- (B) Any extra patches will be distributed to the various lodges for sale to Arrowmen on the basis of their paid attendance at the conference.

NECKERCHIEFS AND MUGS

- (A) Neckerchiefs and mugs reserved in advance will be delivered to lodge advisers for distribution to Arrowmen.
- (B) Arrowmen, not members of lodges reserving neckerchiefs and mugs in advance, may purchase same at the Trading Post on a "First Come - First Served" basis.

CHECK-OUT PROCEDURES

- (A) Each lodge is responsible to clean its own area.
 - 1. Grounds will be policed and all trash placed in trash barrels.
 - 2. Camp tents will be closed and flaps tied.
 - 3. All cots will be ready for pick-up in sites Sunday morning.
- (B) Latrines and showers will be left clean.
- (C) All tools, etc. will be returned to original locations.
- (D) All fires will be completely put out and surplus wood stacked.

WAITER'S JOB IN THE DINING HALL

Each lodge should provide a waiter for each eight persons in attendance for each meal (each table seats eight). This waiter is the only person to go back to the kitchen.

(Waiters should come to the Dining Hall 30 minutes before each meal)

The serving order is:

1. Get plates, silver, glasses, and napkins from the kitchen.
2. Get your food from the kitchen. Get milk and other drinks at the window to the left of the stage.
3. Seconds will be announced - the waiter should walk back to the kitchen to get them.
4. Do not start to clear your table until the lodges have been dismissed.
5. Bring your unopened milk, your butter, and other perishables (mustard, ketchup, etc.) to the kitchen.
6. Put only paper in the "paper" trash cans.
7. Put garbage in the can marked "garbage."
8. Separate forks, spoons, and knives and put them in the racks at the window to the right of the stage.
9. Stack your plates and bring them to the window to the right of the stage.
10. Put glasses in the racks near the dirty dish window.
11. Take bowls and platters to the window to the right of the stage.
12. Put pitchers and empty trays on the large table near the window to the right.
13. Wipe off the table and benches. Sweep under your table.
14. When the table is clean and dry, you may leave.

CAMP SECURITY

A Security Committee has been established for your safety, protection, and the security of the camp property. You can recognize members of this committee by their yellow armbands. This committee is for your use; feel free to ask them about directions, schedules, or emergency helps. They will be glad to help you in any way they can.

Members of the Security Committee will be on Patrol twenty-four hours a day, especially during times when you will be away from your camp site (ie. during meals, group discussions, etc.). There will always be Security Committee Members at their headquarters - day or night. If you have any problems of any kind, feel free to go and talk with them. There will also be members at the main gate to restrict traffic in and out of the reservation to essential traffic only.

SUGGESTIONS

Stay out of other lodge's campsites unless you are the guest of a member of that lodge. Avoid cutting through lodge's campsites on the way to events or activities.

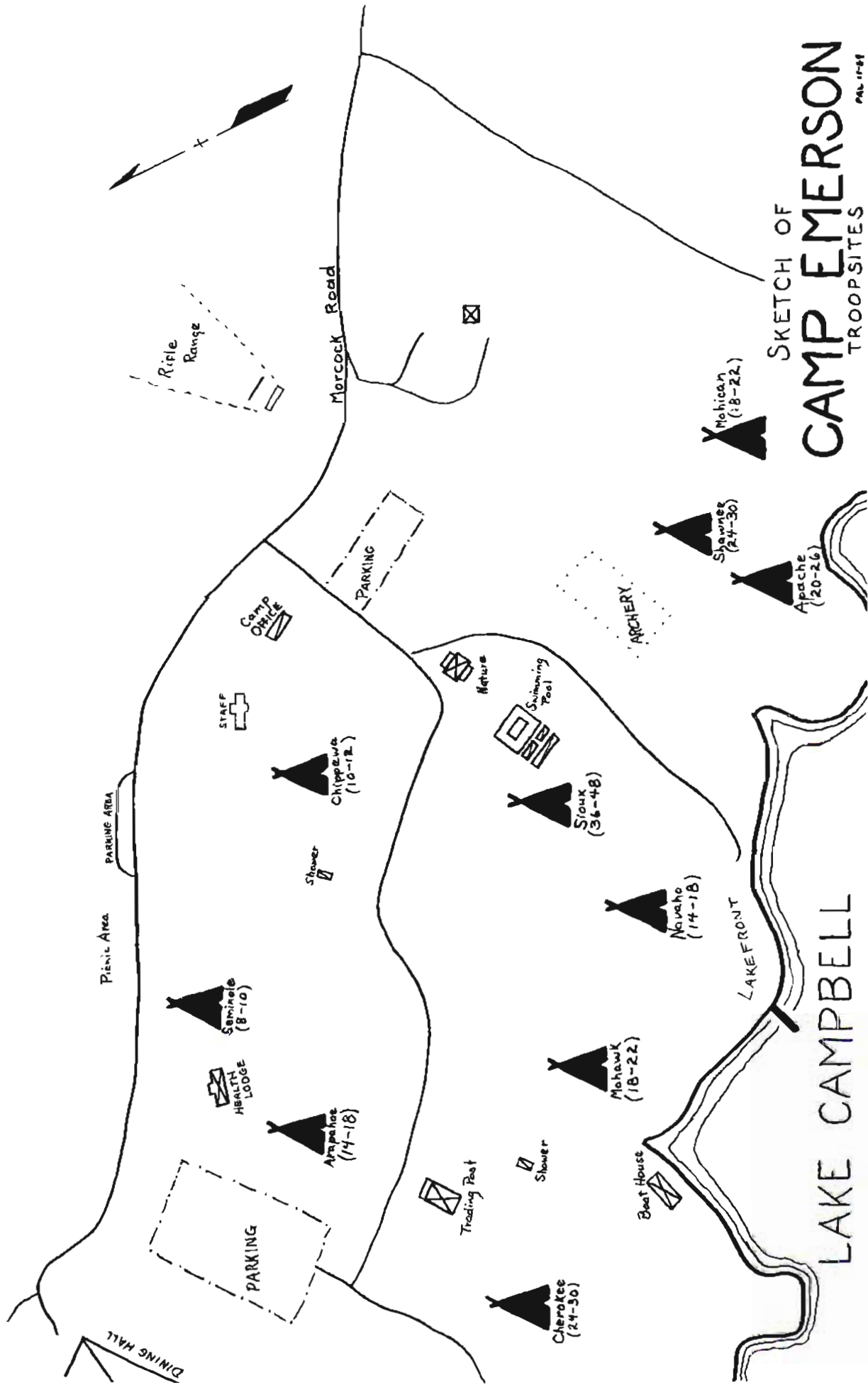
Remain in your campsite between 1:00 A. M. and 6:30 A. M.
Stay out of unauthorized areas such as the kitchen, pool area, etc.
Refer to rules regarding vehicles given to each driver, and obey them.
In an emergency, notify the Health Lodge and your adviser immediately.

Remember, as a Scout or Explorer, you are expected to live up to the Scout Oath and Law at all times.

GENERAL CONFERENCE RULES

The general welfare of any group depends on the conduct of the individual member. This ensures the success of our Conclave and provides the maximum benefit to every participant. The Arrowman understands this and supports the reasonable demands of conduct expected of him.

1. The Arrowman observes the Scout Oath and Promise and Law, the Explorer Code, and the Order of the Arrow Obligation.
2. The Arrowman wears his official uniform, with lodge flap, throughout the Conclave. He avoids wearing unofficial hats, medals or decorations.
3. The Arrowman confines trading and swapping to free and designated periods.
4. The Arrowman should attend all training and general sessions.
5. The Arrowman and his lodge are responsible for breakage, damage, or loss of property.
6. The Arrowman observes quiet and lights out from 1:00 A. M. until 6:30 A. M. All showers and other activities should be finished by 1:00 A. M.
7. The Arrowman keeps quarters clean and neat and disposes of trash properly.
8. The Arrowman respects the state laws and reservation regulations prohibiting the possession or use of drugs and alcoholic beverages in any form on the reservation and those covering fire works, fire arms and gambling. Infractions of these regulations will be cause for immediate dismissal from the Conclave.
9. Liquid gas appliances are prohibited on Bert Adams Reservation. This includes liquid gas stoves and lanterns. If you have a liquid gas appliance with you, please keep it in your car.
10. The Arrowman respects the rules prohibiting the use of private automobiles on the reservation.
11. Arrowmen will not be able to leave the reservation without an adult (over 21) adviser or specific consent of an adviser. Consent of the adviser for an Arrowman to leave the reservation without an adult must be cleared through Security Headquarters. Advisers should not leave, nor authorize an Arrowman to leave the reservation, unless it is absolutely necessary.
12. The Arrowman should remember that a Scout or Explorer is clean and remove all litter before leaving.
