Mr. Downs assumed his post in the fall of 1974, and we are indeed fortunate that he is with us this weekend, since it is not possible for him to attend all of the many Sectional Conclaves held throughout the United States.

Bill entered the Brotherhood in 1941 with Illini Lodge No. 92, where his service included Lodge Chief and the Vigil Honor. Since entering the Scouting Profession in 1950, Bill has held assignments, including Scout Executive, throughout the East Central Region.

WANT TO KNOW ABOUT BERRY COLLEGE & ACADEMY?

Berry College and Berry Academy, adjoining the City of Rome (Population 68,000), are on a campus of 30,000 acres of forests, fields, mountains, lakes and streams. The institutions were founded in 1902 by the late Miss Martha Berry and today includes 40 principal buildings with additional other buildings and faculty homes located throughout the campuses.

Berry College, with 1,700 students, is coeducational and students may reside on the campus or commute from their homes. The college offers the Associate of Science, Bachelor of Arts, Bachelor of Music and Bachelor of Science plus Master of Business Administration and Master of Education degrees.

Berry Academy, with 210 students, is a coeducational college preparatory school with grades 6 through 12. Young men and young women in grades 9 through 12 may reside on the campus. Commuting students attend all grades.

Students also have an opportunity to work at a job—ranging from campus maintenance, laboratories, dining halls and offices, for example, to industry, business and government—a part of the Berry experience in preparing for useful lives and rewarding careers. Of course, earnings may be used to help defray charges. Comprehensive student financial aid is available.

SCOUTING BACKGROUND OF SECTION CHIEF ED HAYS




On Page 14 of the Conclave Program and Notes it states that each Lodge will have one vote for each officer. This is in error, and it should read ten votes.


DON'T READ THIS!!!!


If you failed to see this competition, then you really missed an interesting and informative segment of the Conclave.


