BROTHERHOOD IN CHEERFUL SERVICE by SAM THOMPSON LODGE ADVISER

No, Brotherhood IN Cheerful Service is not a misprint. It is what I experienced as a member of the Order of the Arrow Service Corps at the 2005 National Jamboree.

I was the adviser to a group of 26 young men, 16 to 21 years of age, from Florida to California to New York. This group was one of five similar groups of young men from all over the United States (And one from a foreign country, who was a member of BSA and the OA.), all under the supervision of an adviser and associate adviser. When we started out before the Jamboree troop contingents got there, we were strangers mostly. There were a few from the same lodge. But mostly we didn't know each other. Two weeks later we were without a doubt Brothers in Cheerful Service.

We did just about everything that could be done at a Jamboree: we worked at Merit Badge Midway, in the Action Centers, in the dining halls, we helped set up and take down the OA show, "12 cubed", we conducted the national flag ceremonies, we answered telephones, and we ushered at the arena shows. This last was something that really showed that we were Servant Leaders.

The first arena show was scheduled to have President Bush speak to us. Because of all the security, we had to be in the arena at 2:30 PM; it was 4 PM before we actually got through security. The temperature was 95+; the heat index was 110+. The troops started coming in at 4:30 and we worked to get them seated. Because of security requirement, neither we nor the troops could bring in more that one plastic water bottle. By 5:30 scouts and visitors started getting dehydrated and coming down with heat exhaustion. We saw that if something wasn't done we would have a real catstrophy. We were able to get some bottled water to many people but it wasn't nearly enough. Our service corps youth and adults were running with cases of water to as many people as we could. We were soon having to get people to the medical staff for IV fluids. Service Corps youth were running from IV supply vehicles to the ambulances carrying cases of IV fluid. We became as exhausted as the contingent scouts, but none gave up and quit. Fortunately, by 6:30 someone in authority decided to cancel the show before the President got there. Hundreds of scouts, scouters and visitors went down with heat and water problems, but none of us did. We kept working until we got everyone out of the arena. We had had no food since noon and very little water.

At the next show, when President Bush did make it, we raided the water trucks and positioned hundreds of cases of water out for the scouts and leaders to have. We continue to take water out as the show went on. This and the fact that the weather was somewhat cooler prevented another disaster.

Serving in the Corps was the greatest Order of the Arrow experience I have ever had and will likely ever have. Each service corps group meet each night to discuss the day and to assign service for the next day. On the last night of the Jamboree, we met and each member expressed his feeling about what he had done for the previous two weeks. All were glad the came and all, while they were looking forward to home, sort of wished it wasn't over.

The next Jamboree is not until 2010, when we will celebrate the 100th Anniversary of BSA. There will be a Service Corps working at that Jamboree and I hope to be there also. If any of you who are currently 15 or younger, and want to have a great experience volunteer for the Service Corps.

ONE DAY OF SERVICE

Each year for the past several years our lodge has participated in the "One Day of Service" project that the Southern Region Order of the Arrow started. This involves doing sometype of service project that does not involve our camp or scouting. We plan to do this again this year. It will be some Saturday in October. The final date or project has not been decided, but regardless when you are called upon to help with this, by all means say "Yes."
